

Egg Stamping

Activity: Making pictures stamping plastic eggs in paint.

Items Needed:

Plastic Egg (or a plastic cup)

Instructions:

Pour some paint out onto a paper plate. Take apart a plastic egg and use the open end to dip into the paint. Then lightly stamp it onto the paper. The open end should make a circle shape. Discuss how you started with an oval shape and then when you used a half it made a circle shape. Overlap some circles, introduce a new color. Have fun.

Number Recognition

Activity: Matching numbers with quantities.

Items Needed:

Plastic Eggs

Dominoes (add written numbers to paper)

Paper (write the number on top and draw dots on another side)

Instructions: Write a number on the top of a plastic egg and then draw the corresponding dots on the bottom of the egg. Children will have to match the number with the quantity. For example: the number 3, then three dots ***. For younger children only use 1-5, older children can match up to 10. If you don't have plastic eggs, write numbers on paper and have them match the number/quantity like a puzzle.

Plastic Easter Egg Name Game

Supplies: Cupcake liners

Plastic eggs

Permanent marker

Small bucket or basket

Write one letter from your child's name inside a cupcake liner. Write a matching letter on a plastic egg. Continue with liners and eggs until you have spelled your child's name. Place the eggs in a bucket or basket.

To introduce the activity, help your child put the cupcake liners in order to spell their name, or challenge them to do this on their own. Next ask your child to choose an egg from the basket. Have them name the letter and find the matching cupcake liner. If your child already knows how to spell their name you can include some sight words.
